The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA)\* has been working since 1998 to protect the national herd from a persistent and incurable viral disease (Equine Infectious Anemia) that affects horses, donkeys and mules. Stakeholders from across Canada have identified challenges and made recommendations for a collaborative approach to a national program that would focus on disease prevention. The CFIA, veterinarians, horse owners, event organizers, premise owners and industry leaders were identified as those who share the responsibility of EIA control.
